DIRECTORS STATEMENT

FROM PARKER KEYE EISEN

The Lovers is my debut feature film. It was shot in five days with a crew of nine people in one, hot, sweaty room. The film chronicles Jon and Louise, two passive lovers who are unable to deal with the conflict central to their relationship: should we stay together or break up? Their environment is hot, sweaty, and hazy--just like the set of the film. The atmosphere of the set bleeds into the atmosphere of the film and vice-versa. The film is slow, aching, and contemplative--Tarkovsky meets Bergman meets Mike Leigh. A romantic drama uninterested in the fighting, yelling, and action typically tied to the genre, rather, The Lovers is interested in space, environment, and the emotion of the characters.

Much of the idea stemmed from my desire to control every aspect of the image. Design, dress it, and light it with intent. And that's what we did. I began by dissembling the room above my parents garage, from scraping off wallpaper, ripping up carpets, laying down a hardwood floor made from pallet wood, to painting and building the walls. The Lovers is tactile, hand made with blood, sweat, and tears. Lots of sweat. We were sweating all the time, yet the cast and crew pushed forward. This all to say that the film has a certain texture that comes from the dedication of everyone connected to the production.

I hope for this to carry over to the atmosphere of the film, where as the camera aches through the space, the audience feels the characters pain, confusion, and emotions. The film takes on a slow aesthetic to force the audience into exhaustion and anxiety of waiting for something to happen. Of waiting for Jon to confront Louise. Of waiting for Louise to Leave Jon. Of waiting for Louise to come home. Of waiting for these characters to express themselves, to say what they want. Passivity and confusion is embodied by the watchful eye of the camera, as the walls of the room begin to contemplate the domestic drama of these characters whose perspectives are so wide, yet so warped.

I can only hope the film confronts the audience in this way so that they can discover, create, and live in the world of the characters. I want the audience to draw their own conclusions, not through emotional manipulation, but through the bleeding of their own lives of Jon and Louise. To be hypnotized, frustrated and annoyed by the continuous sound of a leak dripping into a pot until they find themselves trapped, unable to leave the room.









It was made with economics in mind--both literally and thematically. Literally, we had no money. I had to cobble together the set with pallet wood, scraps, cheap paint, and my dad's tools. Long takes are not only a creative decision, but less set-up allows for the honing in of one shot, perfecting every aspect, performance, movement, etc. versus multiple sloppy set-ups. My producer Varun and I put up the dough for our meager budget, everyone else in the cast & crew gave their labor to it. The Lovers is a collective effort.

The film thematically examines how the capitalist system affects the lives of Jon and Louise. An idea not present on the surface, for the effects of capitalism are rooted in society. Financial struggles are the ultimate effect in a system of exploitation for a young couple like them, but Jon is beginning his dive into examining the system, the way it pokes and prods its way into your life whether you like it or not. His obsession with the U.S. Military pillaging other countries is a brief entry way into this theme, how the effects of imperialism are rattling around in his brain so much so that he forgets his relationship in front of him. Louise, on the other hand, is so plagued by work to support them that she can barely stand stomach politics anymore; she is overworked in the abusive restaurant environment. Both are stuck in their own forms of toxic alienation that Capital pushes people to. Jon is shacked up, unable to even look for a job while Louise has to find pleasure and solace in another man. The Lovers is the tragic story of capitalism intervening into the domestic lives of two people who once loved each other.

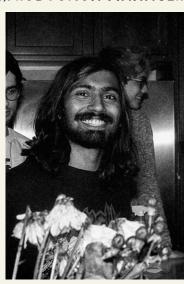
VARUN RAMADHYANI
